Keeping history alive

The wharf at Aldermaston was built in 1723 when the Kennet Navigation, a forerunner of the canal, opened. Local trade flourished in the area – flour, cheese, timber and malt were taken along the canal to London and coal, iron or luxury goods such as tobacco and spirits were brought back on the return journey.

After buying the Kennet & Avon Canal in 1851, the Great Western Railway Company built a small canal channel linking to the railway. This made it easier to transfer goods between the canal and rail.

5 things to do at Aldermaston Wharf

- 1 Take a look at the scalloped brick chamber on Aldermaston Lock, it is just one of two locks on the canal with this.
- 2 Stroll along the towpath and watch the colourful canal boats making their way along the canal.
- Have a picnic and watch the wildlife
 kingfishers, herons, coots and mute
 swans can be seen.

- 4 Chat with our volunteer lock keepers, they'll tell you more about the Kennet & Avon Canal.
- 5 Enjoy a traffic-free cycle ride along the towpath to Woolhampton, well known for its coaching inns.

Did you know?

If you walk along the canal towards Woolhampton bridge, you will see a pillbox. It is one of a number of similar structures built along the canal to defend against German invasion in World War II.
